The Joy of Reading at the West End Center Fuels Fundraising for Bedside Books for Sick Children - A Kiwanis Club of Roanoke 2021-2022 Project by Cheri Hartman

No Joke – the joy of reading can translate into raising the funds needed to buy books for sick children – for whom a special book has been written with the purpose of bringing laughter to a child's bedside. "The Jester Who Jost His Jungle" was written by David Saltzman, who wouldn't let his leakemia steal from him the chance to use his talent to leave a longlasting legacy. Nothing like a child to remind us of the most important things in life — the children at the West End Center did just this with their Springtime readathon conducted in partnership with the Roanoke City Library, the Kiwanis Club of Roanoke, and woutcomes like Susan Kester and the cader of voluntiers. The high school youth were paired up with their young reading buddies to share some quet moments delving into newly purchased books —selected to include characters" who look like them. "Of course, the tenegars embodied everything the young attendees at this after school program aspired to become. What elementary school child doesnit want to grow up to be just like their teenage heroes?" West End Center's Executive Director, Karen Pillis, embraced the mentioning approach to fostering a jow of reading, believing in building resiliency through opportunities to serve others. Books were purchased by the Kiwanis Chub of Roanoke, dozens were donated by Roanoke City Library, and others generously contributed to put new books into the hands of many young readers.

Not only did the older youth help foster a heightened interest in reading throughout the West End Center, but the whole center adopted the goal of a readution—to spend 50 hours reading for a period of a month—the target established to qualify for receiving sponsorship money to purchase 80 copie of The Jester to donate to Carilion's Children's Hospital and the new Lift Health Outeach Program at Fallon Park Elementary School. The West End Center's children rose to the occasion, reaching their reading targets, and the Kivanis Chub of Roanoke purchased almost 200 copies of the delightful hardcover masterpiece of a book, The Jester Who Loss His Jingle. Each West End Center reader earned a copy of the book for themselves and a copy to insorthe with their name as the donor who gifted the book to a sick child. Certainly, a win-win-win all around! The rest of the story has been provided by Carilion — who reports that the beautifully illustrated, brand new hard cover books, crafted by David Saltzman before he succumbed to his disease, in fact, to date, have brought smiles to dozens of childene, ooping with illness and carred for by Carilion Clinic. The Kiwanis Club of Roanoke is grateful to all the partners who collaborated to bring out the best in our children, so that other less fortunat children might have a reason to smile. 
October 12th Club Meeting - Michael T. McEvov
