Nature Park Support Needed January 4th

YOU ARE INVITED to help begin to grow the love in 2023! In 2022 you helped us create a wonderful Wildflower Pollinator Garden that by summertime was a buzz with bees and butterflies.

When? On January 4th at our first club meeting of 2023 Stay after our meeting for no more than 30 minutes to help with this IMPORTANT hands on project!

What? we need you to bring us your love in a jug!!! We will turn your clear plastic empty jugs (we take all sizes!) - into mini-greenhouses for winter seed sowing. (See flyer!) Even if you can't stay to help BRING JUGS! We will collect as many jugs as we can in the next 2 weeks, so we're ready at our first meeting of 2023 to convert those jugs - voila' -- into mini-greenhouses.

ALSO NEEDED: We'll also need sharp scissors or exacto knives - that can cut through the plastic, drills to make holes in the bottom, black permanent markers. Mostly we need YOU and some jugs!

OR ELSE: Jugs can be brought to our meeting OR if you can't make it and if your friends want to leave them with me instead: I have a bin right next to my Santa train in my front yard ready to collect your plastic jugs. Spread the word!

WHAT ELSE!?? Plan to stay after the meeting to help convert the jugs into a habitat for winter seed sowing! Easy fun way to grow your native plants for our wildflower garden so they are sturdy enough by May 2023 at our Spring FunDay Festival to get planted in our Kiwanis Nature Park garden. We are going to double the size of the garden this year (with your help!, install benches and a picnic table and begin creating trails so the garden can attract pollinators and the neighborhood and you! January 4th - see you then - HAPPY NEW YEAR!



January 18th Club Meeting - Richmond Vincent, Goodwill Industries of the Valleys

Richmond Vincent Jr. serves as the President & De Goodwill Industries of the Valleys (GIV) based in Roanoke, VA. In this leadership role, Richmond oversees an organization that has 41 retail stores, 3 distribution centers, manufacturing unit, and a workforce development operations serving over 57,000 Virginians. He currently serves as a Campaign Division Co-Chair for the Roanoke Regional Partnership, a member of the Goodwill Industries International Board of Directors, and Conference of Executives Executive Council.

Prior to GIV, Richmond served as President & CEO at Goodwill Industries of South Mississippi (GSMS) and Mississippi Goodworks. He was a member of the Mississippi Gulf Coast Business Council Executive Committee and Secretary of the United Way of South Mississippi board of directors. Richmond was recognized as a Best CEO in Mississippi by the Mississippi Business Journal.

Before joining GSMS, Vincent served as Senior Vice President of Workforce Development for the Goodwill of Central and Northern Arizona. In this role, he led the organization in serving over 90,000 Arizonans, with more than 45,000 acquiring gainful employment. Richmond also facilitated the organizations first career center co-located with a community-based organization and also spearheaded development and implementation of the initial fundraising program. His community service consisted of serving on the board of directors for the Greater Phoenix Economic Council and the Arizona Association for Economic Development.

Prior to his Goodwill career, Vincent served in an executive leadership role at several financial institutions, including J.P. Morgan Chase and BBVA Compass and was also an entrepreneur for several years. He served on the Governors Council on Workforce Policy and chairman of the Maricopa County Workforce Investment Board.

Richmond earned a Masters of Business Administration and Bachelor of Science in Political Science at Arizona State University. He and his wife Sandra have three daughters and three grandchildren.



January 25th Club Meeting - Jesse Bucher, Roanoke College

Jesse Bucher, Director of the <u>Center for Structures of Race at</u>
<u>Roanoke College</u>, will be speaking on Histories and Genealogies of
Slavery in the Roanoke Valley. His presentation will focus on recent
research carried out by students and faculty at Roanoke College. As part
of a larger process to commission a permanent memorial to enslaved
laborers from southwest Virginia, the research team has used 19th
century records to identify the names and identities of enslaved people.

Jesse is an associate professor of African History at Roanoke College where he also directs the Center for Studying Structures of Race.



the position of incoming club vice president in 2018 before a change in personal plans prompted him to step down.

Bob recently had joined a Kiwanis Club in Naples and proudly shared with us that his "new" club included a former Kiwanis International President on its rolls and that the club was constructing a playground. Bob was an avid ocean line cruiser and enjoyed playing golf immensely.
