

Wednesday, August 16th, Club Meeting - Tim Miller, Education Coordinator at Mountain Castles Soil & Water Conservation District

Join us Wednesday for our weekly meeting at 12:30 PM to listen to Tim Miller, Education Coordinator at Mountain Castles Soil & Water Conservation District. Tim will talk about the sustainable use of natural resources. MCSWCD promotes and develops locally-driven solutions to natural resources concerns for the people of Botetourt County and Craig County by leveraging federal, state, local, and private resources. Tim plans and conducts education and outreach activities for youth and adults that focus on environmental education and water quality issues. A record amount of funding is available to Botetourt and Craig farmers from cost share programs administered by MCSWCD. Most of the funding is tied to efforts to improve the health of the James River and the Chesapeake Bay, although farms in other parts of the county are also eligible to receive cost share

Tim is also the co-owner of Muddy Squirrel, an "adventure education" business that offers single-day, multi-day, and overnight courses related to environmental and outdoor education. He is a former Botetourt County middle school science teacher interested in stimulating student interest in science and the environment through STEM activities, outdoor education, and place-based learning.

John Pendleton's Autobiography

I was born on August 16, 1946. I was the fourth of five children with involved and loving parents. My childhood went smoothly with little league sports, scouts, and elementary school as my main activities. At age 13, my 17-year-old brother was killed in a car wreck which devastated our family but through the support, resilience, and optimism of my parents, I learned ways of coping with difficult situations that has served me well.

I then entered high school along with several childhood friends with whom I remain close and we plan on having another reunion in October. I participated in football, basketball and track, student government, and had a wonderful teacher who instilled a love of history in me that persists today.

After graduation, I attended Hampden-Sydney College, a small liberal

arts school. I had some interest in medicine at that time, but realized that I was not ready to commit to that so I decided to major in history which I greatly enjoyed. I played intramural sports and joined a fraternity where I made a group of lifelong friends.

I graduated in 1968 and had been notified that I would be drafted after graduation. There was no lottery at that time so I begin to explore my options. My brother-in-law had been a Marine pilot so I decided to enter the Marine Corp Officer training program.

After completion, I was commissioned a second lieutenant and soon found myself in Vietnam as a platoon leader in an infantry company. I still have very mixed emotions about my experience and the US involvement in Vietnam, but have consistent memories of the courage and dedication of the men with whom I served. The best of whom was Donnie Howe, my platoon radioman, who gave his life to save his comrades and received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Several of my experiences in the Marine Corp helped me decide to pursue a career in medicine. After my discharge I returned to Hampden-Sydney and completed the premed requirements, and in 1973, I started Medical School at the University of Virginia.

My first year was complicated by my younger brother's battle with cancer. He had become one of my best friends, and watching him struggle and eventually die in February of 1974 was very difficult. But what I learned from observing his interactions with physicians, helped me in dealing with patients throughout my career.

On the upside, I also meet Jill Butler during that year. She was from Roanoke and her father was long time member of this club and served as president. Jill and I dated for a couple of years, then married during my last year of medical school.

We then moved to California, where I did an internal medicine residency at the University of California, San Francisco. We enjoyed our years there but the highlight was the birth our first child, Christen. During my residency I developed an interest in autoimmune diseases so I entered a fellowship in Rheumatology at the Medical College of Virginia. While interviewing for the fellowship, I meet Joe Lemmer who was completing his fellowship, and eventually moved to Roanoke and practiced Rheumatology at Lewis Gale Clinic and is now a member of our club.

While in Richmond, we were blessed with our second child, Frank, who was named after my younger brother.

Upon completion of the fellowship, we decided to move to Roanoke. I love this part of the state, and as a medical student, I had spent time at Roanoke Memorial and knew that I would enjoy practicing in a setting where I could interact with students and residents.

Not long after our arrival in Roanoke, we had our third child, John. Jill and I realized that we were now outnumbered and would have to switch to a zone defense. It also dawned on me that it appeared every time we moved, we had a child so I hoped that things would work out in Roanoke. It did!

My family has been my most important priority while in Roanoke. I tried to participate in my children's lives by coaching soccer and basketball when they were young, and attending as many of their actives as possible as they got older. We spent time together hiking, camping, and skiing as well on a few educational excursions. I have been gratified to watch them grow into mature and contributing adults. I practiced medicine for nearly 35 years at both Roanoke Memorial and the Salem VAMC, and eventually started a Rheumatology clinic at RMH.

I had a large group of patients at both institutions that I treated for many years. This resulted in many close relationships, which was the most rewarding aspect of my career. I also was involved in the teaching programs for both residents and students as well as the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine from its inception. I found this very rewarding and was gratified when I received several teaching awards.

I have been an avid exerciser all my life and after moving to Roanoke began swimming. As Dave Hartman mentioned when giving his autobiography, we swam together 2 or 3 mornings a week for over 30 years. What he did not tell you was that in 1992, he almost made the paralympic team! So, when I say we swam together, that isn't exactly what happened. The truth is, that as Dave was going up and down the pool, I was breathlessly trying to keep up.

I decided to retire from clinical practice in 2017, although I have continued to work with the first- and second-year medical students about six months out of the year. David Lemon kindly invited me to visit the Kiwanis Club. I was impressed with the dedication of the members and the impact of the club on our community. I have greatly enjoyed being a member since then.

But the greatest event of my retirement was when my son John, his wife and our granddaughter moved to Roanoke and now live a block from us. So now as I continue this experience that we call retirement, I look forward to adventures to come.
