

Wednesday, October 4th - Club Meeting - Dr. Verletta White, Superintendent of Roanoke City Public Schools

Dr. White will provide remarks centering around the work that RCPS is doing to empower all students to dream, excel, and reach their full potential. She will also discuss how the school system is working to provide supports for the community through the establishment of the Booker T. Washington Center for Community Empowerment and Education.

A results-driven, student-centered, visionary leader, Dr. Verletta White was appointed Superintendent of Roanoke City Public Schools (RCPS) on July 1, 2020. She has been recognized regionally and nationally for her ability to bring together communities for the benefit of students. In 2023, she was named Virginia's 2024 State Superintendent of the Year, Virginia's Region VI Superintendent of the Year, and was also touted as one of the five superintendents in the nation to watch by K-12 Dive.

Dr. White has been praised for her ability to identify common pain points in the school community, which contributed to a new path forward for RCPS. To that end, she convened more than 40 community and educational leaders and garnered input from hundreds of students, staff, and community members to develop RCPS' 2022 – 2028 Strategic Plan: The Roadmap to Student Success.

In keeping with her desire for all students to graduate with a diploma and a resume rich with skills and experiences, Dr. White introduced Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) in RCPS middle and high schools. AVID seeks to close the opportunity gap in college acceptance and graduation rates among diverse and underrepresented students. Additionally, she created and received approval for the RCPS Equity in Action Plan, which will more than double RCPS' Career and Technical Education student seat capacity, centralize the division's administration offices, and establish the Booker T. Washington Community Empowerment and Education Center. Students in RCPS are demonstrating growth in reading due to Dr. White's focus on literacy, where teachers are having students read, write, and discuss relevant material in every class, every day.

Dr. White believes students remain safe and productive when they are connected to their school and involved with meaningful activities. As a result, RCPS launched Staying Safe by Staying Connected summer athletic and theater camps for middle school students. Additionally, an annual student job fair, RCPS Works was launched to connect students who are looking for summer, after-school, or long-term employment with more than 80 area employers.

Often referring to Roanoke City as "the sweetest City on earth," Dr. White is involved and engaged within the community. She serves on boards and advisory councils for many local, regional, and state organizations, including the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine, United Way of Roanoke Valley, Community Foundation Serving Western Virginia, Western Virginia Public Education Consortium, Blue Ridge Partnership for Health Sciences Careers, Roanoke Education Foundation, Virginia Alliance of Black School Educators, and more. She is also a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and the Girl Friends, Inc.

Previously, Dr. White served the students and families of Baltimore, Maryland through her work in Baltimore County Public Schools (BCPS), the 25th largest school system in the nation. From 2017 to 2019 she led BCPS as Interim Superintendent of Schools and from 2019 to 2020 she served as a Consultant to the Superintendent, researching factors impacting teacher recruitment and retention. Throughout her career, Dr. White served in various roles, including, teacher, teacher mentor, assistant principal, principal, executive director of professional development, assistant superintendent, and chief academic officer.

Dr. White holds a Bachelor of Science degree in education from Towson University, a Master of Arts degree in leadership in teaching from the Notre Dame of Maryland University, and a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) degree in urban educational leadership from Morgan State University.

Dr. White and her husband, Sidney, are the proud parents of two grown children, Victoria and Bethany, both of whom graduated from public schools.

Dana Hinton, President of Hollins University

Dr. Mary Dana Hinton will be speaking on developing outstanding leadership from unexpected places. She will discuss how the leadership qualities we need at this moment are often cultivated in people and communities who have historically been denied access to leadership roles.

Dr. Mary Dana Hinton is the 13th president of Hollins University in Roanoke, Virginia, and President Emerita of the College of Saint Benedict in St. Joseph, Minnesota. An active and respected proponent of the liberal arts and inclusion, her leadership reflects a deep and abiding commitment to educational equity and the education of women. Hinton is a member of the board of directors for the American Association of Colleges and Universities, InterFaith America, Mount Saint Mary's University (CA), The Teagle Foundation and the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, where she is the vice chair. She is a Commissioner on the AGB Council on Higher Education as a Strategic Asset and a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Hinton's scholarship focuses on higher education leadership, strategic planning, the role of education in peace building, African American religious history, and inclusion in higher education. She is the author of The Commercial Church: Black Churches and the New Religious Marketplace in America and a frequent op-ed contributor across higher education publications. Hinton's new book Leading from the Margins, based on her TedX Talk of the same name, will be published by Johns Hopkins University Press in 2024.

Mike McEvoy – Hixson recipient, 9/27/23 Rupert Cutler's Notes for Hixson Presentation to Mike McEvoy

I was glad to be asked by President Mike O'Brochta to make this presentation to my friend Mike McEvoy.

Mike McEvoy has been an active member of the Kiwanis Club of Roanoke for more than 17 years. He was introduced to our club by Kiwanian David Lemon.

A proud graduate of the University of Florida, Mike is a hard-core Florida alumnus and "Gator" fan. He is married to Gail, who is an elementary school teacher in Roanoke City, and has two daughters. Kathleen--known to many of us as Katie--is here. Katie is the Community Development Specialist at West Piedmont Planning District office in Martinsville. Her sister Megan works for the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

Mike worked in Athens, Georgia before he came to Roanoke more than 20 years ago to be the City's Utilities Director. When the Western Virginia Water Authority was created in 2004, Mike and Roanoke County Utilities Director Gary Robertson were named the Authority's co-executive directors, and when Gary retired, Mike became the Authority's sole staff director. Under his leadership, the Western Virginia Water Authority has become an internationally recognized model for facilities of its kind, based on its state-of-the-art technology and its reputation for topnotch administration.

Mike is a very competitive guy. He has won the Roanoke Regional Equipment Roadeo—that's spelled R-O-A-D-E-O-- Executive Challenge several times. His staff describes him as an incredible leader, highly respected by all those who work for him. The Roanoke Valley has benefited from his leadership and his ability to bring localities together in regional cooperation.

On joining our club, Mike quickly became an integral part of club operation, supporting environmental projects and organizing weekly programs. He joined the club's board of directors in 2008 and became president in 2021. He arranged political forums and lined up key leaders in local industry and government to address our club. He chairs Roanoke Kiwanis involvement with Read Across America Day and has coordinated our efforts with First Fridays, the Ironman Triathlon, and the Blue Ridge Marathon. He has obtained significant corporate contributions from major companies.

He has helped lead some of the most challenging KPAD events during COVID and served as our Zoom coordinator for more than three years. Mike has been heavily involved with the Centennial Playground and the Nature Park projects, and he has led our active participation in Roanoke Gives.



He has represented us at many Kiwanis conventions, serving as our club president the last time DCON came to Roanoke in 2021. Our club met virtually, via Zoom, almost the entire time Mike was president, an extremely challenging task. Mike personally developed our new dues structure during that period that accommodates zoomers fairly, not an easy task to keep our club's finances solvent.

It's not coincidental that Roanoke has thrived as a club when many clubs have faltered during this post-COVID period. There are not many Kiwanis Club of Roanoke activities that Mike McEvoy is not involved in.
